
CLEO CHERRYHOLMES



THE LEARNING CURVE



Again Lance Borden and Tom Taylor had an opportunity to present tube related topics to attendees at Electronics Parts Outlet (EPO) on Fondren; this session on the topic of single tube radio construction. Specifically, it was suggested they offer kit fabrication and design basics to a mixed crowd with emphasis on building a foundation and confidence towards use of such a basic circuit. Despite threatening weather, fourteen attendees completed fabrication of their kits prepared by EPO and Lance himself as witnessed by parents and friends. The event was divided up into three parts the first of which was a brief history followed by related theory of most all involved in the radio operation. Followed by two construction sessions that later blended into one larger session for the benefit of those needing more time and those arriving late. Ages varied from preteen to about their late 40s and photo evidence seems to depict a smile for eve-

ryone there as they heard their own radio work. Our hope is to stimulate interest in electronic circuit construction and the inquisitive nature so important to those destined for careers in technical fields.





Five Basic Electronics Classes At EPO



Following HVRA members Lance Borden and Tom Taylor's very successful class at EPO, HVRA president, Bill Werzner was approached by owners to hold several basic electronics classes prior to school restarting in mid August. Five, Tuesday and Thursday, afternoon classes were held starting July 30 and finished on August 15. These classes began with lessons in basic electricity, and progressed to reading electronic diagrams, schematics, identifying components, vacuum tubes, transformers, and solid state. The last class concluded with a lecture about the "All American Five" radio including basic trouble shooting techniques. These classes also included hands on demos along with take home printed material for home study. Many thanks EPO for hosting our series of classes. Perhaps we will be invited for a return performance in the future! Lance and Tom, are you ready for another try next year? I am

ready, and as a team we really generated allot of interest in vintage electronics and HVRA.

_"Don't Pitch That Tube Until You Have Cleaned It"

A couple of days ago I received a call from Vintage Sounds that a customer was buying one or more #26 tubes from our stock and that I needed to replace them. "No problem," I replied as I knew I had bought three new old stock ones during the VRPS auction last fall. No trouble locating them as they were right in front of the other tubes in my vintage tube locker. I decided to

give them a final check before boxing them up and labeling them for sale, so I hauled out my Knight 600 B tube tester. After allowing about a minute for warm up, I pushed the test button and to my dismay, the first one failed the emission test at only 35% on the scale of 100! Knowing that these tubes were probably ninety years old and stored out of box – no telling where, I decided to clean the tube pins even though they looked clean and shiny. I lightly brushed the four pins with a mild wire brush then brushed on some Deox IT contact cleaner from a small sample bottle I had on my work bench. I retested that first tube, add it pegged the meter past 100% when the test button was pushed! This tweaked my analytical German brain, so I began to wonder how many good tubes of that genre had been mistakenly tossed due to what was thought to be weak emission. The culprit here was obviously oxidation of the tube's pins that was easily corrected and we know metal oxides are notoriously poor conductors.*

The #26 tube requires 1.05 amps at 1.50 volts for normal operation. Plugging in Ohm's law of R=E/I, the filament during operation comes in at 1.43 Ohms – not very much eh! Using simple ratio and proportion, if 1.50 volts is 100 %, then what would the filament voltage be at 35%? According to my calculation it would be about 0.53 or 530 mV! Now let's see how very low filament pin resistances would affect filament voltage in a #26 radio tube:

R= 0.05 Ohm, Filament = 1.45 Volts. R= 0.10 Ohm, Filament = 1.39 Volts.

R= 0.20 Ohm, Filament = 1.29 Volts. R= 0.30 Ohm, Filament = 1.19 Volts.

This should be considered especially important when testing vintage tubes that require higher current and low voltage to light the filaments. Other tubes that come to mind are the 2A3, 27, 35, 45, 46, 47, 57 58 & 59. Other tubes that require higher filament voltages and lower current will suffer the effects of filament pin oxidation, but not to the extent of the types I have listed. What about the one volt battery set tubes such as the 1L6 or the loctal 1LN5? The 1L6 miniature has a filament resistance of 28 Ohms during operation (0.05 A at 1.40 V).



With a filament pin corrosion resistance of 0.10 Ohm, the filament would be reduced by only 4 millivolts! The same would apply to many other tubes of those types. Regardless of the tube, I make it a routine to clean the pins before installation or selling them to a customer. The loctal tubes seem to be especially vulnerable to pin corrosion and may require the use of emery cloth or sand paper to remove pin rust and corrosion. Again, I highly recommend painting or spraying the pins with Deox IT following brushing or sanding.

Some vintage tubes will test weak or as burnouts due to pin tip solder failure. This can be corrected by filing down the pins to remove the old solder and expose the copper wire inside. Apply some liquid flux and re – solder the wire end to the pin tips. I have saved a number of otherwise bad tubes by using this technique along with the procedure described above.



The #27 Triode by Bill Werzner

In the last quarter "GL" I presented the detailed characteristics (curves) of the first commercially available #26 triode vacuum tube that could operate with a filament powered by AC current. Preceding the #26 by a few months, the five pin #27 triode was introduced by RCA in May 1927 (the #26 actually came along four months later in September). The #27 was not only unique with a five pin base, but was the first of the newly standardized tubes that utilized a heated cathode for electron emission. This tube has wide applications that include oscillator, detector, and audio amplifier. It is found in many late 1920's radios, test instruments, audio amplifiers, including vintage theater sound systems. Its use continued well into the 1930's. I decided to share this information that I found in a 1940's Tung Sol tube manual that you may find useful in trouble shooting or possibly modifying vintage radios or equipment from that era. Watch for the #71A output tube next quarter.

2020 OLD EQUIPMENT CONTEST

CONTEST RULES

All contestants must register for the Convention and be an active member in good standing.

Previous displays winning First Place in 2018 and 2019 contests may not be entered in the competitive categories of the 2020 contest. These items may, however, be shown as non-competitive displays.

A contestant may enter as many as two displays per category. A display is eligible for only one category.

Contestants must complete an entry card for each display and failure to declare a category is a disqualification from any award.

Reproductions must be properly identified as such.

All displays must be in good, clean, showable condition. Displays in un-showable condition may be disqualified and removed from the contest at the discretion of the Contest Chairperson.

The Contest Chairperson will determine the appropriateness of questions or issues regarding displays and any other rule interpretation.

In case of a tie, the judges or Contest Chairperson may request a functional demonstration of both devices. No fee will be charged for entering the Contest.

All displays must be in place no later than one hour prior to judging, on the Contest Saturday.

Devices of foreign manufacturers may compete in any appropriate category.

Contestants must refrain from discussing displays with judges. If judges have questions pertaining to a display, they must be voiced to the contestant through the Contest Chairperson.


