



Will there be double bed and queen size accommodations? Yes.

<u>Will there be a banquet after the Saturday auction in the evening?</u> There will not be a formal banquet as in the past, but after the Saturday auction, there will be a dinner in the restaurant area of the hotel at everyone's own expense. The contest awards will be given out during the dinner. There will be no speaker or powerpoint presentation for the awards.

2024 HVRA Convention Old Equipment Contest Categories

All displays should be at least 25 years old except where noted

Electronica is Electronic devices or technology, considered collectively (oxford)

- 1. Crystal Receivers and Related Crystal Equipment
- 2. Pre-1928 Battery Radios
- 3. Pre-war consumer radio equipment
- 4. Post-war Consumer radio equipment (tube and solid state) (at least 50 years old)
- 5. Ugly Radios (by design & those made worse by lame restorations)
- 6. Vintage Computers and Computing (at least 25 years old)

7. Collectible and Historical Electronica post- 1960, at least 15 years old (Examples include newer radio equipment, portable music devices, transistor radios, Solid state CRT TVs, unique electronics, etc)

8. Vintage / Antique Electronica Pre-1960 (Examples include Telephones, Telegraph, Scientific Test Equipment, Electrical

Devices)

- 9. Tube type Televisions.
- 10. Kit Radios and Equipment
- 11. Hi-Fidelity Equipment
- 12. Amateur Radio Equipment
- 13. Military Electrical and Electronic Equipment
- 14. Special Convention Theme: Crosley and all items carrying the Crosley name
- 15. Components, including Vacuum Tubes
- 16. Open Display

2024 HVRA CONVENTION OLD EQUIPMENT CONTEST RULES

The official rules for the 2024 HVRA Old Equipment Contest are:

- All contestants must be registered for the Convention and an member in good standing.
- Previous displays winning First Place in the 2022 or 2023 contests may not be entered in the competitive categories of this 2024 contest. These items may, however, be shown as non-competitive displays.
- A contestant may have only two displays in any one category, but may enter any number of categories.
- A display is eligible for only one category and failure to declare a category prevents competition.
- Reproductions must be properly identified.
- All entries must be in good, clean, showable condition. Equipment that is entered in un-showable condition may be disqualified and removed from the contest in the judgment of the Contest Chairperson.
- The Contest Chairperson will determine the appropriateness of questions or issues regarding entries and any other rule interpretations.
- In case of a tie, the judges or Contest Chairperson may request a functional demonstration of the equipment.
- No fee will be charged for entering the contest.
- All entries must be in place no later than one hour prior to judging, on the day of the contest.
- Devices of foreign manufacture may compete in any appropriate category.
- Contestants must refrain from discussing entries with judges. If judges have questions pertaining to an entry, they will be voiced to the contestant through the Contest Chairperson.
- The Contest Rules may not cover all issues that arise in relation to the HVRA Old Equipment Contest. The Contest Chairperson has the discretion to make any decisions necessary in relation to Contest to insure a fair and orderly contest.

2024 HVRA CONTESTANT INFORMATION

Dear Contestant: Please review this summary of our contest rules and guidelines that are printed on the back of this sheet and if you have any questions, please contact **Tom Taylor**, the Contest Chairman.

AWARD CATEGORIES: There are 16 contest categories this year. You must designate on your entry card what category you want to enter your exhibit in (for example, #5 Ugly Radios), and you can enter an exhibit in only one category. You can enter one or two displays in any one category. Each of categories will be given a First and Second place ribbon for the winner. We also have three additional categories you can elect to compete in for greater recognition including **Best Restorations, Vintage Equipment, and Artifacts and Collections.** You must designate on your contest entry card which of these three categories you wish to be considered for if you wish to compete. In addition, each person registered for the Convention can vote on the **Peoples' Choice** award <u>and further each exhibitor can vote on the efforts of a peer for the Exhibitors' Award, worth \$50.</u> Ballots for this purpose are available in the contest room. And finally, there will be a **New Contestant** award for the best exhibit from someone who has not entered our Convention contest previously.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE TOP THREE CATEGORIES: In the **Best Restorations** category the judges will consider the quality of your work along with documentation showing work done, before and after photos, schematics, history relevant to the radio, rarity, and the overall presentation. *We are looking for the best restoration entered in the contest*. For the **Vintage Equipment** category, the judging emphasis will include information about the history of the radio or manufacturer, how the equipment was acquired, rarity, photos, information about clean-up or refinishing, original ads and similar information. *We are looking for the overall best display of vintage equipment*. And finally, entrants in the **Artifacts and Collections** category can include vintage magazines, software, tubes, toys, signs, photos, fans, radio/tv clocks, books, dolls, boxes, uniforms, mannequins, advertising and similar material related to electronics, radios, and communications equipment. Judges will consider overall quality, information describing history of the items, rarity, how acquired, before and after photos and any other relevant information that help make a good display.

GENERAL INFORMATION: We will set up all exhibits in the 16 contest categories in the same display area as best we can. You can set up your display as you wish but the Contest Chairman reserves the right to adjust displays as may be needed to assist with limited space in some instances. Please be considerate of others who will also need space to display their items. If you have questions or concerns, see the Contest Chairman. **Be sure to fill out a contest entry card for each of your entries!!** The contest room will be LOCKED when the Contest Chairman or his designee is not present. When the room is LOCKED such as one hour before judging, NO ONE will be admitted. Judging will be conducted beginning at 9:30 am Saturday. NO ONE IS ADMITTED at that time. **The Decisions of the Contest Judges are FINAL!**

Convention planners have put in a lot of work making sure you have an enjoyable event. Over the next couple of months, we will be looking for volunteers to help at the convention.

HVRA 2024 Old Equipment Contest Judge's Briefing

Dear Contest Judge: As you may know, our members will vote on a Best of Show award as well as Exhibitors will vote on the best Exhibitor award. We have several other award categories for you to help us judge. In addition to the first and second place awards for each of our 16 contest categories, we have three other awards: Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts & Collections. Each contestant will have designated one of these awards for his or her exhibit entry. Please review a copy of the handout we have provided to each contestant. It explains the awards in more detail with significant information about the criteria that will be considered for these new Top Awards. All of our contest rules are also explained in that handout. We also have a best New Contest Entrant award that you will judge.

We use a scoring system for our judging and our briefing will cover this in more detail. We recommend you first take a tour of each exhibit and display together as a group to discuss amongst yourselves the relative merits of the various entries. After that, you would go back and individually finalize your judging score sheets for each contest category. The contest chairman will follow the judging and later collect the score sheets. The Contest Chairperson will then take the score sheets and arrange for totaling the scores. The Contest Chairperson should work with the judges if necessary to resolve any ties in the scoring by majority vote of the judges.

Judging Criteria and Scoring for 16 Contest Categories: We have identified on your score sheet the following criteria for you to use in judging the first and second place awards in each contest category:

Rare, Unique, Unusual or Interesting item(s) Condition or quality of the item(s) Documentation and/or Item descriptions Authenticity Presentation, Showmanship and Contestant Effort

Our scoring ranges are as follows:

0 Below Expectations1 Minimum Acceptable2 Average3 Above average4 Exemplary; rarely exceeded

Judging for the Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts and Collections awards:

Among the categories to be judged are the Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts & Collections contest entries. After you have completed your score sheets and determined the first and second place winners in each of the 16 contest categories, you should review the exhibit cards and your scoring sheet notations to determine winners for these three awards. Scoring is based upon the following criteria for each category:

Best Restoration: Quality of the restoration; information about electrical and/or cabinet or similar restoration as appropriate; before and after photos; restoration documentation; schematics; history and other relevant information; rare or unusual item; authenticity; working condition; and overall display.

Vintage Equipment: History of radio(s) or other items; manufacturer's information; how equipment was acquired; rare or unusual or unique item(s); clean-up or refinishing; original ads; photos; overall quality of the display.

Artifacts & Collections: This category can include a wide variety of radio and electronic items including magazine, software, advertising, mannequins, toys, tubes, fans, radio and TV clocks, novelty items, dolls, boxes, uniforms, and almost anything related to vintage communications equipment and the vintage era. Special consideration is given to the quality of the items; authenticity; how were the items acquired; rare or unusual items; documentation, history, and descriptions; and overall showmanship evident in the display.

Lastly, After completing your decisions about these three awards, please see your judging information for a list of the **First Time Entrants** and select a best entrant or display for this award.

Your decisions are FINAL. Thank you and don't hesitate to raise any questions to the HVRA Contest Chairperson.

(continued from page 9) More from David Herlinger's collection contest discussion of his love of steam engines and astronomy.

The locomotive was made by the Ottaway Amusement Company in 1947. I restored it to operating condition in 1986 and ran

it in my backyard Pine Cone and Mosquito Railroad on my three daughters' birthdays and on July 4 when the girls were growing up. It is coal-fired and operates just like a full-sized steam locomotive. I'm in the process of tearing it down for another restoration. It has a tender for carrying water and three



coaches with four seats each. The track gauge is 12 inches and the locomotive weighs 800 pounds.



The large reflecting telescope was made by Cave Optical in 1964. It was given to me by the original owner 40 years ago. A few years back, I completely restored the fiberglass tube and had the 12.5 inch diameter front surface primary mirror stripped and recoated with a modern aluminized and quartz overcoated surface that is over 98 percent reflective in the visible spectrum. I added an electric clock drive that allows the massive scope follow astronomical objects as Earth rotates on its axis. It is located in a small roll-off roof observatory I share with a fellow retired physics teacher at the Houston Astronomical Society Dark Site near Columbus, Texas.

So why would you not want to talk to people in other states or countries. It might be that to put a signal out requires a little skin in the game, a little venture into the unknown where other listeners might hear you. Some of the answer may be a perceived technical challenge without a mentor.

Well, you can first test the waters so to speak by just listening to the signals in the high frequency, HF, ham bands, AKA 3 to 30 MegaHertz, MHz. You can do this with many portable or stationary receivers that have a Beat Frequency Oscillator, BFO, because today's radio voice is in Single Sideband, SSB. However, for the money it takes to buy some of those receivers you can also buy a used piece of ham equipment called a transceiver that allows both transmission and receiving capable of several modes of communication. Yes, for less than \$150 you can buy used major brand transceivers like Yaesu, Icom and Kenwood providing both transmission and receiving of Single Side Band and Continuous Wave, CW, AKA coded signals in morse. For that matter, most of those rigs can be used for teletype and digital mode exchanges using your home computer and minimum additional cost. Ham radio manufacturers support a very diverse marketplace and the newer full feature glitz transceivers can top \$2,000 if that's your appetite. However, for the used values mentioned you can work all the United States and at times, on some bands, all the continents. For greatest range expect to use one of the many digital modes or CW brass pounding as they say. That is where the reward really is for the purists in the hobby. With the approaching peak to solar cycle 25 you don't even need a separate Radio Frequency, RF, amplifier.

So, what kind of antenna is needed you ask. For receiving, any length of wire or for that matter any conductor will do, the longer the better, be it rain gutter, guard rail, line cord, phone or Ethernet wire etc. If you want a ground rod consider rebar bought or even found on the road, or conduit or cast iron pipe for that matter. Getting the picture? However, for transmitting we want to keep the Standing Wave Ratio, SWR, low so the antenna must be resonant and ¹/₄ wavelength at the chosen frequency will do. For 40 meters AKA 7.3 MHz that's about 32 feet of wire either side of the coax feed point. Wire of all nature, stranded, solid, 16, 14 and 12 as well as larger and smaller American Wire Gauges, AWG, is regularly used on any and most of the HF bands. Resonate antennas ensure most of the power provided at the transmitting source is radiated not reflected back to the transmitter from which it came. Other antenna examples include a hand built vertical with tubular metal material on 15, 10, 6 and even 2 meters. Although wire can be bought at Ace, Lowes and Home Depot, spools of that wire can be found for around \$20 at ham-fests and garage sales. For the Very High Frequency, VHF, {30 to 300 MHz} bands of 6 and 2 meters, 50.1 and 146 MHz respectively, the manufactured antennas are preferred out of convenience and a good buy for as little as \$10 used in some cases. If u can solder with a small propane torch, there is a great performing "J" pole design using ½ inch copper pipe that can be easily built for 2 meters. Directive antennas often called beams or yagis can be bought new for \$130 to well above \$350 depending on your preferences. Like a flashlight these antennas put the signal at the target. Since any conductor will work, hams have always built them for FAR less. That my friend is part of the reward. Your initiative and your ingenuity become the limiting factor, not the cost.

To transmit on a ham frequency, you will need an FCC license that is easily acquired with a test and about \$10 by a local Volunteer Examiner, VE, frequently available at many of the ham-fests. Once your ticket arrives in a few short weeks later you are free to get on the air and explore a hobby that has existed since at least the mid 1920s. It all begins with that first purchase and a bit of reading. Direct your attentions to the Amateur Radio Relay League, ARRL, and a podcast "QSO Today", as well as web sites QRZ.com and QTH.com. Once you are a league member subscribe to that monthly magazine "QST" where you can visualize all the avenues, contests, and equipment open to you.
