



All displays should be at least 25 years old except where noted

Electronica is Electronic devices or technology, considered collectively (oxford)

- 1. Crystal Receivers and Related Crystal Equipment
- 2. Pre-1928 Battery Radios
- 3. Pre-war consumer radio equipment
- 4. Post-war Consumer radio equipment (tube and solid state) (at least 50 years old)
- 5. Ugly Radios (by design & those made worse by lame restorations)
- 6. Vintage Computers and Computing (at least 25 years old)
- 7. Collectible and Historical Electronica post- 1960, at least 15 years old (Examples include newer radio equipment, portable music devices, transistor radios, Solid state CRT TVs, unique electronics, etc)
- 8. Vintage / Antique Electronica Pre-1960 (Examples include Telephones, Telegraph, Scientific Test Equipment, Electrical Devices)
- 9. Tube type Televisions.
- 10. Kit Radios and Equipment
- 11. Hi-Fidelity Equipment
- 12. Amateur Radio Equipment
- 13. Military Electrical and Electronic Equipment
- 14. Special Convention Theme: Crosley and all items carrying the Crosley name
- 15. Components, including Vacuum Tubes
- 16. Open Display

2024 HVRA CONVENTION OLD EQUIPMENT CONTEST RULES

The official rules for the 2024 HVRA Old Equipment Contest are:

- All contestants must be registered for the Convention and an member in good standing.
- Previous displays winning First Place in the 2022 or 2023 contests may not be entered in the competitive categories of this 2024 contest. These items may, however, be shown as non-competitive displays.
- A contestant may have only two displays in any one category, but may enter any number of categories.
- A display is eligible for only one category and failure to declare a category prevents competition.
- Reproductions must be properly identified.
- All entries must be in good, clean, showable condition. Equipment that is entered in un-showable condition may be disqualified and removed from the contest in the judgment of the Contest Chairperson.
- The Contest Chairperson will determine the appropriateness of questions or issues regarding entries and any other rule interpretations.
- In case of a tie, the judges or Contest Chairperson may request a functional demonstration of the equipment.
- No fee will be charged for entering the contest.
- All entries must be in place no later than one hour prior to judging, on the day of the contest.
- Devices of foreign manufacture may compete in any appropriate category.
- Contestants must refrain from discussing entries with judges. If judges have questions pertaining to an entry, they will be voiced to the contestant through the Contest Chairperson.
- The Contest Rules may not cover all issues that arise in relation to the HVRA Old Equipment Contest. The Contest Chairperson has the discretion to make any decisions necessary in relation to Contest to insure a fair and orderly contest.

2024 HVRA CONTESTANT INFORMATION

Dear Contestant: Please review this summary of our contest rules and guidelines that are printed on the back of this sheet and if you have any questions, please contact **Tom Taylor**, the Contest Chairman.

AWARD CATEGORIES: There are 16 contest categories this year. You must designate on your entry card what category you want to enter your exhibit in (for example, #5 Ugly Radios), and you can enter an exhibit in only one category. You can enter one or two displays in any one category. Each of categories will be given a First and Second place ribbon for the winner. We also have three additional categories you can elect to compete in for greater recognition including **Best Restorations**, **Vintage Equipment**, **and Artifacts and Collections**. You must designate on your contest entry card which of these three categories you wish to be considered for if you wish to compete. In addition, each person registered for the Convention can vote on the **Peoples' Choice** award <u>and further each exhibitor can vote on the efforts of a peer for the Exhibitors' Award</u>, worth \$50. Ballots for this purpose are available in the contest room. And finally, there will be a **New Contestant** award for the best exhibit from someone who has not entered our Convention contest previously.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE TOP THREE CATEGORIES: In the Best Restorations category the judges will consider the quality of your work along with documentation showing work done, before and after photos, schematics, history relevant to the radio, rarity, and the overall presentation. We are looking for the best restoration entered in the contest. For the Vintage Equipment category, the judging emphasis will include information about the history of the radio or manufacturer, how the equipment was acquired, rarity, photos, information about clean-up or refinishing, original ads and similar information. We are looking for the overall best display of vintage equipment. And finally, entrants in the Artifacts and Collections category can include vintage magazines, software, tubes, toys, signs, photos, fans, radio/tv clocks, books, dolls, boxes, uniforms, mannequins, advertising and similar material related to electronics, radios, and communications equipment. Judges will consider overall quality, information describing history of the items, rarity, how acquired, before and after photos and any other relevant information that help make a good display.

GENERAL INFORMATION: We will set up all exhibits in the 16 contest categories in the same display area as best we can. You can set up your display as you wish but the Contest Chairman reserves the right to adjust displays as may be needed to assist with limited space in some instances. Please be considerate of others who will also need space to display their items. If you have questions or concerns, see the Contest Chairman. **Be sure to fill out a contest entry card for each of your entries!!** The contest room will be LOCKED when the Contest Chairman or his designee is not present. When the room is LOCKED such as one hour before judging, NO ONE will be admitted. Judging will be conducted beginning at 9:30 am Saturday. NO ONE IS ADMITTED at that time. **The Decisions of the Contest Judges are FINAL!**

HVRA 2024 Old Equipment Contest Judge's Briefing

Dear Contest Judge: As you may know, our members will vote on a Best of Show award as well as Exhibitors will vote on the best Exhibitor award. We have several other award categories for you to help us judge. In addition to the first and second place awards for each of our 16 contest categories, we have three other awards: Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts & Collections. Each contestant will have designated one of these awards for his or her exhibit entry. Please review a copy of the handout we have provided to each contestant. It explains the awards in more detail with significant information about the criteria that will be considered for these new Top Awards. All of our contest rules are also explained in that handout. We also have a best New Contest Entrant award that you will judge.

We use a scoring system for our judging and our briefing will cover this in more detail. We recommend you first take a tour of each exhibit and display together as a group to discuss amongst yourselves the relative merits of the various entries. After that, you would go back and individually finalize your judging score sheets for each contest category. The contest chairman will follow the judging and later collect the score sheets. The Contest Chairperson will then take the score sheets and arrange for totaling the scores. The Contest Chairperson should work with the judges if necessary to resolve any ties in the scoring by majority vote of the judges.

<u>Judging Criteria and Scoring for 16 Contest Categories</u>: We have identified on your score sheet the following criteria for you to use in judging the first and second place awards in each contest category:

Rare, Unique, Unusual or Interesting item(s)
Condition or quality of the item(s)
Documentation and/or Item descriptions
Authenticity
Presentation, Showmanship and Contestant Effort

Our scoring ranges are as follows:

0 Below Expectations

- 1 Minimum Acceptable
- 2 Average
- 3 Above average
- 4 Exemplary; rarely exceeded

Judging for the Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts and Collections awards:

Among the categories to be judged are the Best Restoration, Vintage Equipment and Artifacts & Collections contest entries. After you have completed your score sheets and determined the first and second place winners in each of the 16 contest categories, you should review the exhibit cards and your scoring sheet notations to determine winners for these three awards. Scoring is based upon the following criteria for each category:

Best Restoration: Quality of the restoration; information about electrical and/or cabinet or similar restoration as appropriate; before and after photos; restoration documentation; schematics; history and other relevant information; rare or unusual item; authenticity; working condition; and overall display.

Vintage Equipment: History of radio(s) or other items; manufacturer's information; how equipment was acquired; rare or unusual or unique item(s); clean-up or refinishing; original ads; photos; overall quality of the display.

Artifacts & Collections: This category can include a wide variety of radio and electronic items including magazine, software, advertising, mannequins, toys, tubes, fans, radio and TV clocks, novelty items, dolls, boxes, uniforms, and almost anything related to vintage communications equipment and the vintage era. Special consideration is given to the quality of the items; authenticity; how were the items acquired; rare or unusual items; documentation, history, and descriptions; and overall showmanship evident in the display.

Lastly, After completing your decisions about these three awards, please see your judging information for a list of the **First Time Entrants** and select a best entrant or display for this award.

Your decisions are FINAL. Thank you and don't hesitate to raise any questions to the HVRA Contest Chairperson.

Your Place as a Ham (Part 2) by Tom Taylor

So where do you go to find equipment and to meet others in their learning curve that want to operate as ham? Hamfests! And where do hamfests take place as well as what are they? Searching the web for "Texas Hamfests" and you will attain the Amateur Radio Relay League, ARRL, list to Be sure then to look back to that site during the pick from. year for new or late listings. For those hamfests well away from this immediate area you might find the wife interested in surrounding shops or in finding a friend to go with who is willing to share the expenses. This author can say first hand that you can 'bag' a load of your needs at these hamfests because there is often a reason for the sale such as an estate being unloaded to ANY willing buyer. Bargains and skilled operators abound.

Typical attractions include the once a year spring hamfest in Rosenburg just south of Houston on US59. Other events have taken place in San Antonio, Orange, Huntsville, Baytown and Austin. However, the big one might be considered 'Belton' where the Temple Amateur Radio Club, TARC, resides {not to be confused with the Texas City Amateur Radio Club in the city sharing that acronym}. The Belton event occurs both in the spring and again in the fall where eager participants have made MANY a deal before sunrise! It's not uncommon to meet a lot of familiar faces and see trailer loads of gear showing up as well as hand trucks and scooters of goods moving outbound during the day. If you have decided to become a ham radio operator you absolutely MUST do Belton at least once. Everything supporting the hobby shows up! Lastly you might consider the 'Cowtown' hamfest event in Ft Worth and stay at the historic hotel Texan in the stock yards. Thank me

For those that would like to learn the morse code but need an aid there are electronic devices that plug into the transceiver audio jack and display received characters in text form streaming across an LCD screen. There are also devices that store frequently used morse encoded words that can then be sent as a stream to the transceiver and out once selected by the operator. If you should want to test the output of a transceiver without intentionally transmitting a signal, a power resistor (preferably non inductive) can be used in place of an antenna. In that application it is called a 'dummy load' and you should know that a little signal can still be radiated when using it instead of an antenna. Should you want to visually watch or analyze that signal there are Cathode Ray Tube, CRT, monitors that can be inserted in the coax feed to either the antenna or the dummy load.

Any attempt at teaching the basics of 'ham' or 'amateur' radio should start with some term definitions such as frequency and wavelength. These two are directly related to one another by a constant 'C' which is 300,000,000 meters/second. When you are given the frequency you have been given the wavelength, because frequency X wavelength = 300,000,000. Recall that some of our early AM broadcast band radios used dial numbers denoted in wavelengths? With this relationship in mind you can better understand why the high frequencies, HF, around 1.8, 3.5, 7.3, 14.2, 21.3 & 28.3 MegaHertz AKA MHz

are equated to wavelengths of 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meters AKA mtrs respectively the last of which is currently the nomenclature used on front panels of ham equipment.

Since the meter is really a measurement of length it should be no surprise that resonate antennas for a given frequency are made by cutting a wire to near that length OR for convenience about a 1/4 fraction of that length. In other words, a wire antenna for 40 meters is about 33 feet long either side of the feed point. BTW, it's no accident that all those HF frequencies are nearly multiples of one another. By releasing a segment of frequencies with those approximate center points, the Federal Communication Commission, FCC, put in place the condition that the harmonic of poor signals in one band would primarily be heard to a lesser degree in an upward multiple of that band thereby keeping dirty laundry of the hams in their other frequency allocations. They were then not likely to be heard in other assigned band segments which might be military, or commercial or even allocated to foreign stations that have broadcast time slots during their night which would be our day periods. Early transmitters of the 20s and 30s using morse code as a broken tone referred to as a continuous wave or CW had a great deal of frequency shifts about its intended center point as well as sound irregularities like chirps, clicks and warbles. Those signal annoyances interrupt vital communication on nearby frequency allocations which can be dangerous or result in an official FCC citation. IF you should want to hear those unique yet troubled signals you need only tune in the CW or low portion of bands during certain antique and classic radio contests that favor use and restoration of antique pieces. There are few better contests for this treat than the Bruce Kelley 1929 QSO Party contest or ARRL 'Classic' radio contests that take place once or twice a year. Another event sponsored by the American Wireless Association, AWA, draws in many of the antiques allowing operators to acquire points for working one another. Manufacturers of most all equipment available these days pride themselves as sources of pure CW notes and can even clean up imperfect morse spacing in your attempts at sending clean CW characters.

Contests exist during the year to satisfy nearly every interest for selected or for all modes, for low power or for levels up to a legal limit around 1500 watts for HF. That's right. Knock your hole in the ether with legal gear reliant upon house 220 VAC using antennas that might agitate your neighbor for that two way into points within Europe or the south Pacific. Contests for the upcoming month can be found on the ARRL web site OR in their publication, the QST, under its title, Contest Corral. If ever you tune in to a ham band and hear nothing near a weekend you can bet your best coffee cup they are getting ready at the starting gate to catch as many stations as possible in an approaching time period. If you are interested in hearing such a beehive of activity be sure you know Greenwich Mean time AKA Zulu relative to your local time because that focal is universally accepted for event synchronization.


Continued from page Your Place as a Ham (Part 2) by Tom Taylor

One contest is even dedicated to bouncing VHF signals off the moon for a short exchange with another ham across the world. That contest is called EME for earth moon earth and generally requires multielement yagi antennas, good timing, RF power amplifiers and patience. Still another fine opportunity to use the VHF and UHF frequencies is to talk live with a crew of the International Space Station, ISS, or to bounce signals through passing satellites launched just for that task. ISS and satellite linkups however are for the most part via an exchange where the uplink is one frequency and the downlink frequency is another. When doing this you need a 'cross link' transceiver and expect to shift your frequency slightly as the satellite comes into and out of view ie. towards the horizons one way then the other. This is due to the doppler effects caused by significant distance changes as the satellite nears that horizon. Most all these links just mentioned are using the SSB mode of operation. However, it is possible to use your laptop in conjunction with your transceiver to transmit digital mode signals your friend just down the road could not hear on his receiver that is being decoded by software at an operator's station on the opposite side of the earth. That operator in turn sends his response in a similar way which is decoded by software downloaded to your laptop so that his text streams across your screen virtually real time. What a kick.

I hope you have found here that there is an endless list of possibilities to challenge yourself at a modest budget and step into competition with others now in their learning curve. If you can accept in your winter or next overheated summer timeline a little competition with peers you might later meet at a hamfest, THIS IS your gig!! The reward can only be attained when you take steps like these.

<u>Universal Output Transformer</u> by Bill Werzner

This universal output transformer is rated at 8 watts and sold by Antique Electronics Supply in Tempe, AZ. I have used this transformer in many repairs and it's performance was excellent. It is versatile, not expensive, and this old copy of an original hookup diagram includes some of the earlier tubes we find in vintage radios. The newer diagrams that I have seen omit the 45, 41, and 42 tubes. I recall using this transformer as output a number of years ago for a 71 triode, but don't remember which of the lugs I wired to the speaker. To do it over, I would simply attach one wire to terminal C and select one of the three others using alligator clips for the best sound. The same technique would apply for some of the more modern unlisted output tubes as well.




